- 1. Texas has poor education quality compared to most other states
- 2. Education quality in Texas has decreased rapidly from COVID and the loss in education has the potential to cause significant damage to Texas' economy
- 3. Texas systemically underfunds its education system and diverts federal funds designated for education to other purposes
- 4. Most voters support increasing state-level education funding and nearly all voters support advocating more federal funds in Texas towards education
- 5. Most voters disapprove of how Texas currently handles its public education system

Key take-away/talking point - Texas has a relatively poor and underfunded education system that will pose substantial risks to our economy going forward. Most Texas voters support increasing funding for education.

- 1. Texas has poor education quality compared to most other states
 - a. EducationWeek's Quality Counts report on school quality in the US ranked Texas as the 42nd best state for education, giving the state a final grade of a C- (3)
 - b. A poll from the Raise Your Hand Texas Foundation asked Texas voters to grade their school– only 56% graded their school as an 'A' or a 'B' (3)

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- 2. Education quality in Texas has decreased rapidly from COVID and the loss in education has the potential to cause significant damage to Texas' economy
 - a. Texas Commissioner of Education Mike Morath explained at the Dallas Regional Chamber's annual State of Public Education that educational quality has decreased dramatically from COVID (4)
 - i. The number of students proficient in Math dropped by 15 points, Reading declined by 4 points
 - ii. This declined is estimated to cause \$2 trillion in damages to the Texas economy through loss in potential earnings
 - iii. Morath argued that "This is the largest problem facing the state of Texas,
 [and] it is larger than every other problem that we face, probably
 combined"
 - b. Dallas Innovates' historical analysis concluded that fewer than 4% of students who fall behind academically ever catch up in Texas. (4)

3. Texas systemically underfunds its education system and diverts federal funds designated for education to other purposes

- a. A study done by the Southern Poverty Law Center confirms Texas underfunds its schools compared to other states (8)
 - i. The study ranked Texas 40 out of 51 (the study included Washington D.C.) in terms of educational spending per student
 - ii. The study gave Texas an 'F' for its funding
- b. A report in the Austin American-Statesman indicated that the Texas State government systemically diverts federal funds designated for education (7)
 - In 2021, the federal government sent Texas 19.2 billion dollars to supplement its education program- "a significant chunk of those dollars was held back as "surplus," never going to the schools for which it was intended"
- c. In 2019, the Texas legislature approved \$6.5 billion in additional education funding (11)

- 4. Most voters support increasing state-level education funding and nearly all voters support advocating more federal funds in Texas towards education
 - a. A voter survey from the Texas Education Grantmakers Advocacy Consortium in January of 2021 confirmed widespread support for education (1)
 - i. 67% of voters support increasing state-level spending on education, increasing to 71% after voters are given more information about the issue
 - 81% support requiring Texas to spend federal education grants on education in Texas, increasing to 86% after voters are given more information
 - b. A voter survey from 2019 by the University of Texas found that 55% of voters supported increasing budgets on K-12 public education (10)

5. Most voters disapprove of how Texas currently handles its public education system

a. A poll from the Texas Politics Project in October of 2021 found that nearly 42% of Texans disprove of how the State handles public education– with only 26% of voters supporting how education is handled (9)
